

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The Role of the Region of Durham in Addressing Homelessness

The Region of Durham is legislated by the province of Ontario as a Service System Manager (SSM) for Housing and Homelessness through the Housing Services Act and is the designated **Community Entity** by the federal government for the homelessness system.





Winter Warming Centre

A Winter Warming Centre is a temporary safe space that provides a warm place for individuals experiencing homelessness to seek protection during cold weather conditions. Winter Warming Centres are typically open during the winter months (November – March) when temperatures drop to dangerous levels. Services offered at winter warming centers often include:

- Shelter: A warm, safe place to stay, overnight
- Basic Necessities: Providing essentials such as hot meals, snacks, beverages, blankets, and warm clothing.
- Hygiene Facilities: Access to washroom and possible showers.



Winter Warming 2023-2024 Highlights

Accessible & Inclusive

- 150 overnight safe spaces available 7 days a week, plus additional spaces in Durham's shelter system, including for medical needs.
- Pets welcomed.
- Cots/chairs for individuals and couples, with oversized options available.

Coordinated Access

- More individuals added to the By-Name list.
- Winter Warming Centres connected underserved individuals to the homelessness system.
- Coordination between agencies eliminated preopening lineups.

Partnership & Engagement

- Local businesses donated meals, snacks, and winter care packages.
- Coordinated communication between Winter Warming Centres and the Regional Street Outreach Team.
- The Outreach Team provided transportation and follow-up support to individuals.



Winter Warming Lessons Learned


- Accessible space with washrooms and showers within each community
- Staying open 7 days a week regardless of the temperature
- Winter Warming offered in all local area municipalities
- Increased access to transportation options between winter warming centres
- More daytime programming in some Durham communities

Clarington's Unique Challenges

Geographic Spread of Unsheltered Population:

- Clarington covers a large area with hidden homelessness (couch surfing, encampments, sleeping in cars).
- A centralized service last year led to more visible homelessness downtown, showing the need for a better-located facility.

Limited Daytime Supports:

- Local churches provide meals and drop-ins
- Salvation Army Food Pantry and Coffee Hub
- John Howard Society recently added as an Access Point for Clarington
- Bowmanville Library





Why 181 Liberty Street South is Ideal

Building Highlights:

- Fully accessible
- Close to downtown Bowmanville for walkable access to food banks and support, but not in the heart of downtown
- Smaller office spaces for families or individuals with unique needs
- Multiple washrooms and a shower on-site
- No major concerns raised by Clarington Emergency and Fire Services
- Minor updates needed for safety (Fire Code and Building Code compliance)





Why 181 Liberty Street South is Ideal for the Winter Warming

Regional Responsibility:

- Building Preparation: The Region will ensure the building is ready for use and make any needed adjustments.
- Operations: The Region will manage operational expenses through a service provider.
- Responsiveness: The Region in partnership with Clarington will support and address concerns and challenges.
